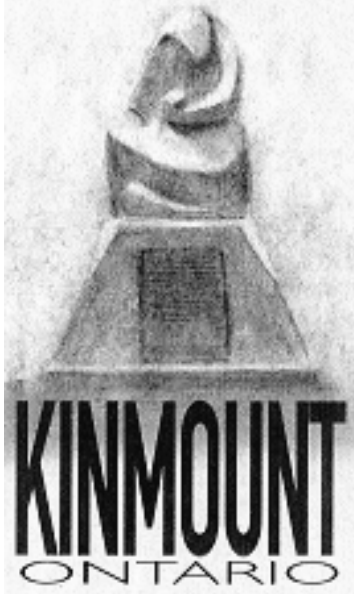

How To Get There, You Ask?

*From Toronto, take the 401 East-
ward, beyond Oshawa to Hwy
35/115. Turn north along Hwy
35/115 – but do not continue on to
Peterborough. Turn north along
Hwy 35 towards Lindsay. Follow
Hwy 35 north around Lindsay to
Hwy 121 through Fenelon Falls,
Burnt River until the Icelandic Set-
tlement tourist road markers ap-
pear. Make a left turn into Kin-
mount from Hwy 121, and proceed
to the railway station site. You will
also find parking on side streets or
in front of the Baptist Church.*

You are advised to bring a hat, sun-
block, bug spray and a lawn chair.
There are several food vendors in the
village and bathrooms are located at the
Railway Station, Community Centre,
Gas Station and at Restaurants.

The path to Gimli is a pilgrimage on horseback beginning in Eyrarbakki on the south coast of Iceland and ending at Islendingadagurinn, a Festival in Gimli, Manitoba, on July 30th 2005.

The Icelandic horses have arrived and are stabled in Magnetawan and await their Icelandic riders to join them on their long trek from Kinmount, ON to Gimli, MB.
