Skaftafell in Iceland

A Thousand Years of Change A Presentation/Book Reading by Dr. Jack D. Ives Sunday, January 27th

For many years Dr. Jack D. Ives has nursed the idea of bringing together under one cover an account of his friendship with Ragnar Stefánsson, an Icelandic sheep farmer, and his family.

He met Ragnar in 1952 on the first of many visits to Skaftafell. As an English undergraduate student he was overwhelmed both by the grandeur and remoteness of the landscape and, by the culture and history of the farmers of the area.

He witnessed the conversion of a remarkable isolated and austerely beautiful landscape into a national park together with the transformation of the people and their ways of life.

Indeed, Skaftafell has become one of the primary destinations for the increasing number of visitors to Iceland as well as for Icelanders. Because Jack's career has taken him into many outstanding mountain regions throughout the world, he came to recognize the global significance of Skaftafell's natural and cultural heritage.


Therefore, it is not over-presumptuous to attempt to demonstrate this vital importance. Sometimes the impressions of a visitor can provide a useful and complementary perspective to those of native-born Icelanders.

The book is subdivided into three parts supplemented by eleven appendices. *The first part* attempts to explain Ragnar's own sense of time and place and his relationship with his local and wider region. To do this, it is necessary to go back to Ingólfur Arnason's first landfall in AD 874 under the headland that bears his name, Ingólfshöfði, which could be seen by Ragnar from his farmhouse.

In working through the centuries, using the somewhat unconventional approach to assume perceptions and attitudes of a number of principal characters, some possibly mythical, others startlingly real, the author eventually reaches 1952, the date of his own first arrival. At this point he moves to *the second part*.

This is a narrative of the University of Nottingham student expeditions of 1952–1954, including a detailed account of the fatal accident of August 1953. It also outlines some of the results of their research. It is recounted at some length because it demonstrates how Jack came to be bound to Ragnar and Skaftafell. It is also an example of the influence of Iceland and Icelanders on the lives of visitors from overseas.

The third part is an account of the second half of Ragnar's life that is inseparably linked with the origins and evolution of the Skaftafell National Park leading to the author's presumption of eventual World Heritage recognition. He uses his own extensive experience with UNESCO, the United Nations University, the World Conservation Union (IUCN), as well as his university teaching and mountain research career, to illustrate the many challenges and opportunities that development of the park entails.

INFO. FROM CONSUL GAIL EINARSON-McCLEERY

THE DREADED 3 MONTH RULE

I was reminded by an item in a Consular newsletter, that people need to be careful when booking out of country travel that their passports have at least three months to run (and recently I have even heard of countries requiring six months!)

One case involved an American tourist who had not been allowed to board a connecting flight from Miami and then to Iceland, because his passport's validity was less than three months. The man was going to stay only for a week and was in possession of a return ticket. Upon checking with border control in Iceland, the Consul, whom the tourist contacted, was told that the three month rule was really not being enforced at this time, so the airline in question did eventually allow the American on another flight. It is always better to err on the side of caution, so make sure you check what the requirements are now ... three months six months.

ICELANDIC HERITAGE SOCIETY OF CANADA

Dear Sirs/Madams:

The Icelandic Heritage Society of Canada was formed in the Spring of 2006 and was granted charitable status by the Canada Revenue Agency in February of 2007. It was established as a medium to raise money for the purpose of supporting the study, preservation and promotion of the Icelandic heritage enjoyed by many of us in Canada and the United States.

One of the first initiatives undertaken by the Charity was to look at ways that it could provide assistance to the Icelandic Emigration Centre at Hofsos. This came at the request of the operators of the Centre. It has been decided that we can best assist by raising money for the creation of specific projects at the Centre. We have had discussions with representatives of the same concerning an exhibit which would explore and pay homage to the Icelanders in Manitoba and in particular Winnipeg. We have also had discussions concerning an innovative museum-style installation on "Icelanders in the Pacific Northwest." We have enclosed a brochure prepared in connection with these plans.

Our Charity is also open to supporting, and making our charitable status available, to a variety of different ideas and projects that have been undertaken by others. That is subject, of course, to the project falling within the purposes stated above.

This Society is in the process of commissioning the creation of a life size sculpture of Sigtryggur Jonasson, "Father of New Iceland", for installation at Modruvellir (Sigtryggur's farm) near Riverton.

The hydro plant is located in the highlands, very isolated in winter time and rough and unpredictable weather along with his strange coworkers make Baldur's surroundings inhospitable.

"Cold Trail" is the first full length feature film by director Björn Br. Björnsson, but he is well known for his work in advertising and for television. The film is professionally made but suffers, as so many other Icelandic films, from a weak and in some parts confusing script. The actors all put in a reasonable performance, though some have a little difficulty in hiding their stage origins.

But good cinematography along with good music build up suspense and with some help from the fantastic Icelandic winter landscape make "Cold Trail" an interesting and enjoyable movie.
